Christmas Tree Disposal

Residents in all 34 communities served by the Mid Michigan Waste Authority can put their fresh Christmas trees to the curb by 7 am on their regular trash day throughout the month of January.

You do not need to remove ornaments, tinsel, garland or other decorative items, and trees can be put to the curb with or without a tree bag.

Trees that are frozen to the ground or covered with snow will not be collected until they can be safely accessed by the driver. Large or heavy trees may have to be picked up by the bulk truck, and in those cases, trees should be collected within two days of the resident's regular service day.

The service applies only to Christmas trees that have been used as indoor holiday décor. State law prohibits yard waste and vegetation from being disposed of in the landfill; however, the ban does not apply to Christmas trees. Artificial trees may be placed to the curb as a bulky item at any time of the year.

Fire Safety Inspections

The Thomas Township Fire Department offers home fire safety inspections free of charge. A fire official will come to your home and perform an inspection indicating areas which may pose a hazard and offer a suggestion or two on preventing the hazard. Burning Candles Facts

- 38% of home candle fires started in the bedroom.
- •December is the peak time of year for candle fires, 13% of home candle fires began with decorations as compared to 4% the rest of the year.
- •Falling asleep was a factor in 12% of home candle fires.
- •The top five days for home candle fires were Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, New Years Eve, New Years Day and Halloween.



Chimney Maintenance

Having a fireplace can be very fun, safe and romantic. It can also be a great method of alternative heating. With fireplaces, comes the need to maintain them. Depending on how you use or maintain your fire place / chimney, you may have an above average build up of creosote. It is extremely im-



portant to properly maintain a chimney and to properly dispose of the ashes. The chimney itself needs to be cleaned out regularly, depending on your usage. There are a couple different methods of accomplishing this. One of those methods is to contact a chimney sweep company so they can clean and inspect your chimney. Properly disposing of fireplace ashes can be another significant hazard. As hard as it may seem to believe, these ashes can hold heat for several days. It is very dangerous to remove your ashes and place them in a combustible container (plastic trash can or trash bag) and leave them inside a structure. It is best to place these ashes in a metal container, and keep them outside away from any structure. This may prevent your ashes from starting a fire in your garage, house or other building.

If you think you might have a chimney fire, the fire department can respond and check it with a thermal imaging camera which detects heat. We use it to check those hidden areas to ensure you don't have any "hidden" fires. The attic space is one of those forgotten areas where fires can begin due to a small hole in the chimney which can allow creosote to "flow" out of. Please feel free to contact our fire prevention bureau if you have any questions regarding this issue.

Fire Safety During the Holidays

With the snow season comes many small things we forget about that can have big returns, in terms of safety. What I am talking about are the safety items that need extra attention during the winter months. Please take a couple moments to review this list to help ensure your safety throughout these cold months.

- 1. Keep a clear distance around your furnace, hot water heater and heat vents.
- 2. Have your chimney cleaned regularly.
- 3. Keep your closest fire hydrant shoveled out (at least three feet).
- 4. Ensure all your household exit doors are accessible.
- 5. Be VERY careful when using candles.
- 6. Test your smoke detectors to ensure they work.
- 7. Educate your family on your own safe meeting place, outside the home.
- 8. Ensure your carbon monoxide detector is operating properly.
- 9. If you have a live Christmas tree... water it regularly and do not let it dry out.

Department of Public Works, a Year in Review

Public Works operates and maintains the water distribution system that includes over 115 miles of water mains, 933 fire hydrants, 1,703 valves, and services 4,756 residential, commercial, or industrial customers. From December 2017 through November 2018, we helped provide 993,873,000 gallons of water (or an average daily water use of 2,722,900 gallons per day). Over the past year, staff repaired or replaced 617 water meters, and added 27 new customers. And, your Public Works staff responded to 1,620 water related issues for the year that includes 136 "Check for Leaks" or follow-up requests, helping residents and business owners alike find the causes of high water uses through leaky fixtures and water services. These efforts saved customers potentially thousands of dollars in wasted water use.

The Public Works staff also operates and maintains the sanitary sewer system that includes over 67 miles of sewer mains, 700 manhole structures and 15 sewage pumping stations located throughout the Township. The sewer system services 3,370 residential, commercial, or industrial customers. From December 2017 through November 2018, we discharged 403,457,000 gallons of sewage, or an average daily discharge of 1,105,000 gallons per day for treatment and disposal.

Besides the maintenance and operation of the water and sewer system, staff also provided over 830 underground utility locates through the MISS DIG system. Buildings and facilities generally fall within the responsibilities of the Public Works Department too. This year staff performed landscape maintenance, painting and cleaning services to 7 different buildings or grounds including the Township's Owen Cemetery. We also inspected over 25 miles of sidewalk and performed preventive maintenance on 30 sidewalk pads by removing tripping hazards. (These efforts saved residents and businesses the cost of having to replace the sidewalks at their expense). Public Works staff replaced the Gratiot Road Banners numerous times over the course of the year, and of course completed the Holiday decorations seen throughout the Township. A special shout out goes to our seasonal help this year that consisted of Mark, Dave, Noah and Jeffrey. Without their hard work, Public Works would not have been able to accomplish the little extra things that make Thomas Township a great place to live.

What's coming up for next year? We are looking at completing some extensive sewer system maintenance and cleaning. We are planning to replace two water main crossings along North River Road and will continue to install or update water meters under our water meter replacement program. Finally, your public works will continue to strive harder and harder to provide the best possible service for the least cost possible. Thanks for your support and it is a pleasure to work for you. Rick, Jerri, Renee, Darold, Trevor, Darryl, Steve, Jayson, Tyler, Mark, Dave, Noah and Jeffrey.

Нуdrants can be difficult to see in the dark when they are buried in snow it becomes even more of a challenge second when every counts.

Please do not plow snow against a fire hydrant as you are not only making it difficult to get to it in emergencies, you are likely damaging the water pipes connecting the hydrant to the water mains underground. You never know, the next time that hydrant is needed, it may be for your home.




From the Treasurer


Listed below is a sample tax bill detail for an average home in Thomas Township. The only amount of your tax bill that the Township keeps is listed below as "Township Operating". This amount is equal to about 3-4% of your total winter tax bill. Local Operating (general fund) is the amount of money the Township receives to operate everything in the Township, except the Library, Water Department and the Sewer Department.


The Public Safety millage (6-7% of the tax bill) and the Fire millage (1% of the tax bill) offset the majority of the Police Department and Fire Department expenses, but the General Fund must still supplement a large percentage of their operations. This holds true for the Parks & Recreation Department as well.

The Township Library also receives its operating income from a local millage, which was voted in by Thomas Township residents. About 2% of each tax bill goes to operate the Public Library in Thomas Township. The remaining 85% of your tax bill is sent to various OTHER taxing jurisdictions such as the County of Saginaw, Delta College, solid waste pickup and the local schools.

Assessing Updates

Your 2019 Assessment Notices will be in your mailbox the last week of February, 2019. THIS IS THE ONLY NOTICE OF WHAT YOUR ASSESSMENT (SEV); TAXABLE VALUE (TV) AND PRE EXEMPTION WILL BE FOR 2019. If you have any questions about your assessment notice, you should contact the Assessor as soon as your assessment notice arrives in the mail. Do not wait, as you may lose your opportunity to appeal these values.

There is only one time of the year that assessments can be protested, and that is at the March Board of Review. The 2019 March Board of Review is tentatively scheduled for March 11th and 12th, 2019 (please call to make an appointment). If there is an error in your assessment and you wish to appeal the values, which the assessor placed on your property, you must attend the March Board of Review. If the Board does not agree with your appeal, you may then protest to the Michigan Tax Tribunal; however, you <u>must</u> first appeal to the March Board of Review. The Assessor can be reached Monday, Tuesday and Friday from 9:00 am until 5:00 pm.

Check Out the Newest Addition to the Thomas Trail

The Thomas Trail is a great way for residents to get out and enjoy the community in a safe environment away from motorists. Residents of all ages use the trail for walking, running, biking and more. The Thomas Trail also connects to the Townships many miles of sidewalks making it even easier to safely travel throughout our community.



Since the Thomas Trail has been such a

success, the Township has continued to add to it. In 2018, the Parks and Recreation Department added .83 more miles of the trail in the community. The addition extends from Shields Drive and heads north along the Consumers Energy Right-of-Way to North Miller Road. This extension brings the trail to a total length of 3.13 miles long. The Thomas Trail connects to the Saginaw Valley Rail Trail just south of Ederer Road, which enables our residents to bike, run or walk to St. Charles or Saginaw Township.



Residents will also see another new addition to the Thomas Trail at the connection with the Saginaw Valley Rail Trail. At the intersection of the two trails there is now a sign showcasing participating businesses as being a part of the community.

Join An Archery Class

Archery classes begin on January 3rd, 2019 at the Saginaw Field and Stream Club, located at 1500 N. Gleaner Road. All archery classes are six week programs taught every Thursday.
