Lighting the Township a Community Effort

Did you notice the Christmas decorations this year? Many new changes were made, with just as many new hands involved in making Thomas Township a beautiful place for the holidays. This article will describe some of the changes that were made, why, and who was instrumental in turning this year's displays into some of the nicest in the region.

Over the last number of years, we have been decorating the various campus buildings, streets, and roadways in conjunction with the Roethke Park Christmas Train and Festival of Lights. This has turned out to be a labor of love, and your Public Works and Parks Staff work hard decorating the various areas. Each year, we try to add to the displays, and have incorporated many changes year by year. This year was no different.

In the past we have had major difficulties with the rented decorations that were hung on the light poles along Gratiot Road



each year. These lighted decorations tended to trip off whenever wet weather conditions happened like rain, ice or snow. To

reset them, our crews had to climb 20 feet to reset the electrical plugs each time they tripped. With 100 poles with decorations on them, this proved to be a time consuming safety issue as the weather conditions



and traffic along Gratiot Road made working in the area repeatedly risky.

Last year, we made the decision to make our own decorations using LED lights and fittings we felt were best suited for our light poles. Many ideas and designs were drafted by Township staff and then turned over to the Mr. Kennely, Shop teacher at Swan

Valley High School. There he assigned some of his advance metal working students the task of building them, using materials paid for by the Thomas Township Business Association. Beginning in late February of this year, the students fabricated and constructed almost all of the hanging decorations that were used along Gratiot Road this year.

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Over the summer and early fall, seasonal staff at Public Works painted and installed the lights on them. In early November, another group of high school Honor Society students from Swan Valley finished decorating the fixtures as well as assisted in decorating the Township's various buildings, trees, and bushes.

In mid-November, volunteers from St. Mark's Lutheran Church and the Thomas Township Kiwanis Club installed the new decorations along Gratiot Road, and finally, staff from the Township's Parks and Public Works Departments added the final touches to make



this year's holiday displays better than ever. A big Thank You goes out to the many hands that made our community a beautiful place for the holidays.

<u>CARBON MONOXIDE....</u> YOU MUST KNOW MORE

Each year we hear stories of a family who must grieve over someone who succumbs to the negative effects of Carbon Monoxide (CO). When we respond to a resident's home that has CO throughout the home, we sometimes hear, "I didn't smell anything so I thought everything was ok" or "I didn't think it would happen to us".

It might appear CO calls only occur in larger communities and we are somehow identified as "exempt" from those incidents. I can assure you we are not exempt and have had some very close calls within our own community. Although not every call we respond to is plastered in the headlines, we are called upon to more CO emergencies than you might think. During any one of these CO calls, if we save just one life, it's worth it. If you were to speak to any one of the people impacted by CO, you would hear their appreciation.

The most important thing you can know about CO is that according to its Safety Data Sheet (SDS), CO is a colorless, odorless flammable gas which contains properties that can literally kill you. CO over prolonged exposure can harm you in multiple ways up to and including asphyxiation. You need to be aware of the signs of CO poisoning. Basically CO is a dangerous gas.

Our Department recently responded to a situation that started out as an average medical emergency. While arriving on the scene, a MMR Paramedic alerted us to a possible CO problem. Our responders checked the air quality in the home and discovered dangerously high levels of CO. Fortunately, this call ended well....

We sent six family members to the hospital with CO poisoning. You might be asking, "How did that end well if they all went into the hospital"? This very easily could have ended six people lives had one member not awakened to a crying baby! My point is, it can happen here and does. Take CO seriously!

PREVENTION is simple. *Install a CO detector*. We have pushed hard for years to have smoke detectors installed in every home. It is equally important to also have a CO detector(s) in *every home*. Quality CO detectors are more expensive than smoke detectors but are equally important. We have had better

luck with CO detectors that have a *digital read out* as opposed to those that do not, and these can be purchased from merchant's right here in our own community.

While outfitting your home with CO detectors is somewhat expensive, the dividends earned are well worth every dime spent towards prevention. It is recommended to have a CO detector on every floor of your home. 2016 Assessment Notices

Your 2016 Assessment Notices will be in your mailbox the last week of February, 2016. <u>THIS IS YOUR</u> <u>ONLY NOTICE OF WHAT YOUR ASSESSMENT</u> <u>(SEV)</u>; <u>TAXABLE VALUE (TV) AND PRE EXEMP-</u> <u>TION WILL BE FOR 2016.</u>

If you have questions about your assessment notice, you should contact the Assessor as soon as your assessment notice arrives in the mail. DO NOT WAIT, as you may lose your opportunity to appeal these values.

There is only one time in the year that your assessments can be protested, and that is at the March Board of Review. The 2016 March Board of Review will meet March 14th, 15th and 16th (call for times).

If there is not an error in your assessment,

and you wish to appeal the values, which the Assessor has placed on your property, you <u>must</u> attend this March Board of Review.

If the March Board of Review does not agree with your appeal, you may then protest to the Michigan Tax Tribunal; however, *YOU MUST FIRST APPEAL YOUR ASSESSMENT TO THE LOCAL MARCH BOARD OF REVIEW*.


Do You Know Where Your Tax Dollars Go?

Listed below is a tax bill detail for an average home in Thomas Township. The only amount of your tax bill that the Township gets to keep for general operations is listed below as LOCAL OPERATING. This amount is equal to about 2.60% of your total winter tax bill. Local Operating (general fund) is the amount of money the Township receives to operate everything in the Township except the Library, the Water Department and the Sewer Department. While the Public Safety millage (9.55% of tax bill) and the Fire millage (1% of tax bill) offsets the majority of the Police Department and Fire Department expenses, the General Fund must still supplement a large percentage of their operations. This holds true for the Parks and Recreation Department as well.

The Township Library also receives its operating income from a local millage, which was voted in by Thomas Township residents. About 3.0% of each tax bill goes to operate the public Library in Thomas Township.

The remaining 82% of your tax bill is sent to various OTHER taxing jurisdictions such as the County of Saginaw, Delta College, solid waste pick up and the local Schools.

SNOW SEASON = SNOW AWARENESS

With the snow season comes many small things we forget about, but can have big returns, in terms of safety. Please take a couple moments to review this list to help ensure your safety throughout these cold months.

- 1. Keep a clear distance around your furnace, hot water heater and heat vents.
- 2. Have your chimney cleaned regularly.
- 3. Keep your closest fire hydrant shoveled out (at least three feet).
- 4. Ensure all your household exit doors are accessible.
- 5. Be VERY careful when using...candles (see note below).
- 6. Test your smoke detectors to ensure they work.
- 7. Educate your family on a safe meeting place, outside the home.
- 8. Ensure your carbon monoxide detector is operating properly.

CANDLE FIRE FACTS

- st 38% of home candle fires started in the bedroom.
- * December is the peak time of year for candle fires, 13% of home candle fires began with decorations as compared to 4% the rest of the year.
- * Falling asleep was a factor in 12% of home candle fires.
- * Top five days for home candle fires were Christmas, Christmas Eve, New Year's day, New Years Eve, and Halloween.

We do offer, <u>free of charge</u>, home fire safety inspections. Two fire officials would come to your home for a free fire safety inspection of areas which might pose a hazard and offer a suggestion or two on preventing the hazard. Now, when you call for assistance, there are thirty-three eligible men and women to answer that call for help. As a community, we are extremely fortunate to have these thirty-three dedicated members who give up so much of their own time to help others. Our fire fighters and responders all maintain fulltime jobs, have hobbies, operate households, and have families. They make time to regularly attend training sessions and meetings to maintain their skills and respond to calls. Each fire fighter and emergency responder will invest approximately 360 hours in the fire academy and another 80 hours in medical classes.

We welcome these three new faces and I encourage each of you to say 'thank you' to all of the Fire Department members as you see them in our community. WINTER RECREATION PROGRAMS ARCHERY CLASSES

Archery classes began again on January 7, 2016, at the Saginaw Field and Stream Club. Classes are for both beginner and advanced archers. REMEMBER, ONLINE registration is available for Parks and Recreation Programing. When using the online registration system to register for Parks and Recreation Programing, you MUST pay for the program you are registering for at the time you fill out the registration form or you will not be considered enrolled in that program. Registration is a two step process. Once you hit REGISTER NOW, you will register, agree to the terms and hit SEND. You will then be redirected to the payment options on the next screen. If you have not received a confirmation of payment, you are not registered. Some program sizes are limited, and make sure the form you are using is not out of date.

PARKS AND RECREATION OFFICE HOURS

2016 PAVILION RENTALS

It's time to reserve your pavilion for the 2016 season. Residents <u>only</u> can rent in January. In February, we open up the registration process to non-residents. The fee for any of the four pavilions is \$50 for Thomas Township residents; \$80 for non-residents; and \$100 for companies. There are three pavilions at Roethke Park and two at Roberts Park.

GIRLS' BASKETBALL

Girls' basketball leagues are forming for 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 4th, 5th, 6th grades. Girl's in 4th grade can choose to play up with the 5th and 6th graders or down with the 2nd and 3rd graders. Sign up continues until January 22, 2016. After this date, a \$10 late fee will be assessed, with no registrations taken after January 29, 2016. Saturday games begin February 20, 2016 at Swan Valley High School. Player fees are \$40 for Thomas Township residents and \$45 for non-residents. Volunteer coaches are needed for this program. The draft for girls in 4th-6th grades is January 30, 2016 at 1:00 pm in the Swan Valley High School Gym. Shirts will be provided.

YOUTH FLOOR HOCKEY

Floor hockey will again be offered to Y5's-K and 1st-2nd-3rd graders. The six week season begins on February 20, 2016. This program is held on Saturdays at

Swan Valley High School and is for both boys and girls. Floor hockey is recreational in nature and there are no practices or standings kept. Fees are \$40 for Thomas Township residents and \$45 for non-residents. Shirts will be provided. Registration continues until January 22nd. After this date a \$10 late fee will be assessed. No registrations can be taken after January 29, 2016.

ADULT VOLLEYBALL LEAGUES

Adult volleyball teams can sign up for the spring league for women either recreational or power and men's power begin in March and games begin in April. Games are held weeknights at the Swan Valley Schools. There is a \$125 team fee and \$10 player fee for Thomas Township residents and \$15 for non-residents.

WINTER FUN IN THE PARKS

SLEDDING

There is a lighted sled hill at Day Park on South River Road for your winter sledding FUN! Day Park is located on South Miller just north of Ronald Drive.

ICE SKATING

There are two ice rinks in Community Park behind the Township Office buildings at 249 North Miller Road. Due to the unpredictable Michigan winter weather, and the fact that the temperature tends to climb during the day and fall at night, we cannot guarantee the quality of the ice. One rink is for hockey and one is for leisure skating. Please pay attention to the "Rink's are closed" signage if it is up. You will see the signs primarily after the rinks have been flooded and are not frozen solid or after a natural thaw. We close the rinks to ensure your safety on the slushy ice.

These winter activities are not monitored by Township Staff, so parental supervision is mandatory for the safety of all participants.



Looking Back on 2015

It is amazing how fast a year goes by. Just yesterday, the spring flowers were blooming and now there's snow on the ground. This time of year, we all seem to do a little reminiscing, so this article will highlight the efforts of the Department of Public Works over this past year.

Public Works operates and maintains the water distribution system that includes over 130 miles of water mains, 950 fire hydrants, 2,115 valves, and services 4,720 residential, commercial and industrial customers. From December, 2014 through November 2015, we helped provide 943,205,000 gallons of water (or an average water use of 2,584,120 gallons per day). Over the past year, staff repaired or replaced 630 water meters, and installed another 18 for new customers.

Your Public Works staff responded to 1,242 water related issues for the year that included 150 "Check for Leaks" or follow-up requests. They helped residents and business owners alike find the causes of high water uses through leaky fixtures and water services. These efforts potentially saved those customers thousands of dollars in wasted water use.

The Public Works staff also operates and maintains the sanitary sewer system that includes over 67 miles of sewer mains, 700 manhole structures and 15 sewage pumping stations located throughout the Township. The sewer system services 3,350 residential, commercial, and industrial customers. From December, 2014 through November, 2015, we discharged 391,270,000 gallons of sewage, or an average of 1,071,970 gallons per day for treatment and disposal. Besides the maintenance and operation of the water and sewer systems, staff also provided 1,049 underground utility locations through the MISS DIG system, and responded to 862 various customer requests for the year.

Buildings and facilities generally fall within the responsibilities of the Public Works Department too. This year staff performed landscape maintenance, painting and cleaning services upon 7 different buildings or grounds including the Township's Owen Cemetery. We also inspected over 25 miles of sidewalk and performed preventive maintenance on 33 side-

walk pads by removing tripping hazards. These efforts saved residents and businesses the cost of having to replace the sidewalks at their expense. Public Works staff replaced the Gratiot Road Banners numerous times over the course of the year and completed the Holiday decorations seen throughout the Township. A special shout out goes to our temporary seasonal help this year that consisted of Mark, Dave, Noah and Dan. Without their hard work, Public Works would not have been able to accomplish the little extra things that make Thomas Township a great place to live.

On the construction front, we replaced the water main along North Miller road in conjunction with the road rebuilding project. That new water main was sized and designed to service the water system for the next 50 years. What's coming up for next year? We are looking at completing some extensive sewer system maintenance and cleaning.
