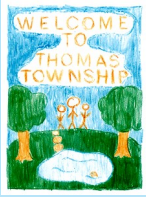

## It's Time to Heat Things Up!

Now that the temperature is starting to cool down its time to start thinking about the heating season. Do you have your furnace or chimney cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional? Having this done annually could save you from the unthinkable. Over half of home heating equipment fires are reported during the months of December, January, and February.



If you use portable space heaters in your home, always make sure you have a 3 foot area of clear space around the heater and always turn the heater off when leaving the house or going to sleep. Never run portable heaters off of an extension cord as it can overload the outlet, which could cause it to overheat and possibly start a fire.

Another important measure you can take is to make sure you have carbon monoxide (CO) alarms installed in your home to prevent CO poisoning. These alarms should be installed outside of sleeping areas and on every level of your home. If your alarm sounds you should move to a fresh air location and call 911. Carbon Monoxide is an invisible, colorless, odorless gas so you would not be aware of its presence in your home without a properly installed CO alarm. A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a long period of time or by a large amount of CO over a short period of time. Symptoms of CO are often described as "flu-like" and could include headache, dizziness, weakness, vomiting, chest pain, and confusion. Large exposures can result in loss of consciousness or death. Please keep in mind our office is only staffed from Monday thru Friday between the hours of 8am-5pm. If you have an emergency, you must call 911.

## Emergency Signal: Two Years Later

As many of us travel N. Miller Road we all see the emergency traffic signal in front of the fire station. The signal was installed two years ago to protect our fire fighters and trucks as they pull out and back into the fire station.

For the most part, it works well. However, we do have some people who continue to drive around the fire truck while it is backing into the fire station. While I understand everyone is in a hurry to get to their destination, this puts our emergency responders at a high risk of being struck by a vehicle. On a recent traffic stop by our Police Department, the driver was asked "with the traffic light red and the fire trucks lights operating, why didn't you stop? To which their reply was, "There was so much red, I didn't know what to do". As much as the majority of us would think a red light means to stop, that is not always the case with others. My point is, we are really trying to keep it safe out there and protect our people. If you find yourself in front of the fire station when the trucks are coming and going please stop and yield to them. Perhaps, if you are the first vehicle in line, you stopping may prevent someone else from driving through the traffic light.

I also from time to time get asked, "How come I never see that light working?". We mostly use the emergency signal when the large trucks are returning from a call. Occasionally, if we have people at the fire station they may use it for trucks leaving on a call. 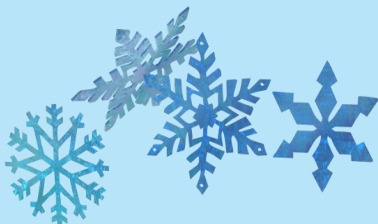

## Sidewalks and Snow

After a snowfall, all residents and businesses must make certain that their sidewalk is cleared within 48 hours of the storm. Michigan weather is so unpredictable and sometimes it snows for days at a time that's why it is important to clean your sidewalk as soon as possible so it does not get packed down from an accumulation of several snow falls or from the walkers that use them.

Residents young and old are use sidewalks to get around and exercise. Thomas Township has over 10 miles of sidewalks connecting subdivisions, businesses, parks, library and schools. If you use the sidewalks make sure the next time you see someone shoveling them that you express your gratitude. Their efforts are a benefit to the entire community. ## A Message from the Department of Public Works

Another summer has quickly passed us up greatly exceeding what should be the speed limit for seasons! As we move into the fall, your Public Works will be busy flushing and winterizing all the fire hydrants located throughout the water system. This is a normal maintenance function that is extremely important to ensure the fire hydrant in your area works properly if needed in an emergency. As those flushing activities begin, you may see cloudy water from your home's water taps. This is a normal occurrence, and is typical of flushing activities. If your water appears discolored or is cloudy, simply run your water taps for a short period of time to clear your home's water piping. This flushing activity also means that there may be areas with standing water or puddles, specifically within the road right-of-ways and along curbing. In some cases, fire hoses or other piping is used to diffuse or to direct water away from potential pooling in areas and yards.



## Veterans Display at Owen Cemetery



As Veteran's Day sneaks up on us, Thomas Township remembers our heroes with the Veteran's Display located at Owen Cemetery. The display was constructed by residents of Thomas Township, for the benefit of honoring those that have served in the Armed Forces of the United

States. The idea of the display was inspired by the death of Lance Corporal Thomas Echols, a Michigan raised Marine killed in action in Iraq in December, 2006. Tom was 20 years old when he died a hero helping to protect our freedoms and left behind a young widow and unborn daughter.

It is a shame that in our busy lives, we sometimes fail to remember those who answered the call to duty except during a couple of holidays each year. When Thomas Township constructed this display, it was designed to be a living tribute, not strictly a memorial. Residents can honor their veteran with an engraved paver installed in the reflection area of the monument. You too can honor your Veteran with an engraved brick simply by stopping in to the Municipal Offices Building located at 249 N Miller Road and filling out the order form. The cost for each brick is \$35.00. This is not a fundraising endeavor and the cost for a paver only represents the actual expenses we incur to purchase and engrave a paver.



## November 6th, 2018 General Election

On September 5, 2018, the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals revived Michigan's ban on straight-party voting by issuing an order staying the lower court's order in the straight party case. This means that the option to vote straight party will **NOT** appear on the November ballot and voters must go line by line if they want to vote for candidates in partisan races. In the past, a single mark could automatically count for candidates of a single party, from governor to county commissioner.

The last day to register to vote is October 9, 2018. If you are in need of an absent voter ballot, applications can be obtained at the Thomas Township Clerk's office, 249 North Miller Road, Saginaw, MI 48609 or by calling the Deputy Clerk, Darci Seamon, at (989) 781-0150. An application can be mailed to you, but please don't wait until the last minute as mail service can take up to one week. Please allow enough time to mail the ballot back and forth. The last day to receive absent voter ballot applications to be mailed is Saturday, November 3, 2018 by 2 pm. It is advised to turn them in sooner due to longer mail processing times. The office will be open November 3<sup>rd</sup> from 8 am to 2 pm to accept applications and distribute ballots. Absent voter ballot registrations for hand delivery will be accepted in the office until Monday, November 5<sup>th</sup> at 4 pm. A voter who visits the Clerk's office on Monday, November 5<sup>th</sup> to obtain an absent voter ballot **MUST vote the ballot in the office**; the voter is not permitted to leave the office with the ballot.

If you need to check your registration status, visit the Michigan Voter Information Center at [michigan.gov/vote](http://michigan.gov/vote). This site allows you to check your registration status, look up your voting location and view your sample ballot and track your absentee ballot. This service is also available on smart devices. Just scan the QR code and it will load.



If you do not have access to the internet, please call the Clerk's office at (989) 781-0150. Make your vote count and vote in the November 6<sup>th</sup> General Election.

If the property tax statement has not been received by December 7th, 2018, please contact the Deputy Treasurer, Korina Tucker, at (989) 781-0150. You can also email the Deputy Treasurer at [treasurer@thomastwp.org](mailto:treasurer@thomastwp.org) to request a copy.

For your convenience, a drop box is available by the south side of the Thomas Township Municipal Office building for making payments after hours. The drop box is checked at 8:00 am each morning that the Township holds business hours and all payments are considered received on that day. All payments must be received or postmarked no later than December 31st, 2018 to be considered paid in 2018.

**REMINDER:** When paying in person, please bring the entire tax notice with you (both top and bottom portions) and our staff will stamp the top portion paid for you as your receipt.

## Archery Program

The Thomas Township Parks & Recreation Department will continue to offer archery classes this winter. Thomas Township now has three USA Archery and National Field Archery certified instructors on staff.

Registration is taking place now through Friday November 30, 2018 for both Beginning Archery & Explorer Archery (formerly Advanced Archery) classes. Beginning Archery is for everyone from age eight through Adult! Classes for beginners work on safety, form, equipment and the fundamentals to become a good archer. 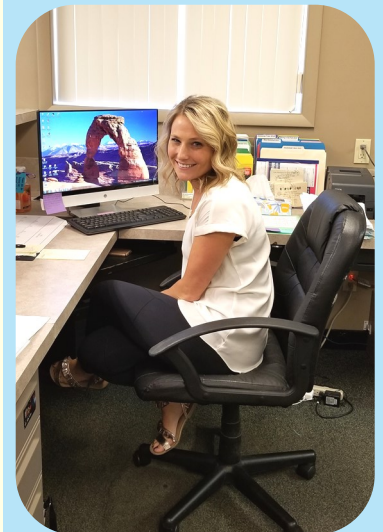

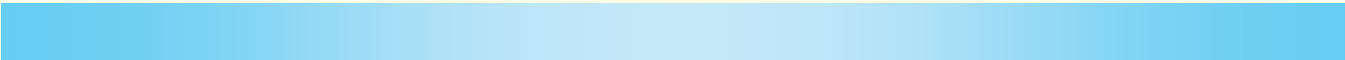
