Water Quality Report from the DPW Department

In conformance with the Safe Drinking Water Act, Thomas Township is required to provide all users of the water system a Consumer Confidence Report each July. This report outlines the drinking water quality that is delivered to your home or business. The 2023 report, as well as all prior reports, can be reviewed by visiting the City of Saginaw's website at:

Beginning in late April, the DPW staff began its yearly maintenance work on both the water and sewer systems. For our water system, we will be completing preventive maintenance on all of our fire hydrants. This work will include flushing the water mains and testing the operation of each fire hydrant. The work is done to make sure that our hydrants operate properly in emergencies and to remove air, "old water" or mineral buildup that may have become trapped within the water mains. Overall, these activities will ensure the water that is delivered to your home or business is of the highest quality available. During the overall maintenance work, we will also be lubricating, painting and color coding each hydrant, while ensuring that the hydrants are un-obscured. In some areas, we will measure water pressure and flow rates of a particular water main while flushing a hydrant. The work will be completed in phases ending in October. Additionally, if you have a hydrant located in your yard, please make sure that plants and shrubs are at least 6 feet away from the centerline of the hydrant. This clear area is necessary so that the hydrant can be quickly located, hooked to and operated in emergency conditions. Thank you for your help.

Work on our sanitary sewers will begin in mid to late May and continue through the summer months as we clean major portions of the sewer pipelines of grease and "other" built up materials. Cleaning will consist of high-pressure and velocity water and is necessary to ensure that the sewers continue to flow unobstructed. This work is expected to be completed by October 1st.

DPW also performs minimal maintenance on public owned sidewalks. Our staff inspects all of the sidewalks in the Township, and "scarifies" trip hazards. Additionally, if the sidewalks are noted to be in extreme dis-repair, they will be turned in to Code Enforcement for potential replacement.

Lastly, I want to give a special shout out to our DPW employees. Thomas Township has been extremely busy the past few years with infrastructure improvements, on top of our regular responsibilities. These employees consistently go above and beyond for the Township, and they deserve recognition. Steve Everett (Foreman), Darryl Eaves, Tyler Branch, Kito Sharper, Tyler Sharp, Andy Skiendziel, John Donahue, Mark Foy, Mike Messisco, Bob Seeber, Chris Cousins, and Meghan Prinz. Motorcycle Safety

Summer is here and I think most Michiganders will agree that nothing beats a beautiful summer day in Michigan. Whether your perfect day involves golfing, hiking, swimming, or just going for a drive, this time of year is magical. Not only are there more vehicles on our Michigan roads this time of year, but you will see many motorcycles traveling our roads as well. In fact, according to the State of Michigan, there are currently over 600,000 licensed motorcycles in our state.

In 2017, Michigan introduced the "Look Twice. Save a Life" campaign to bring awareness to motorcycle safety. Funded in part by motorcycle endorsement fees, this campaign's goal is to reduce the number of accidents and fatalities for motorcyclists because these accidents can be so deadly. In fact, a motorcyclist is four times more likely to suffer significant injury and twenty-four more times likely to die in an accident than someone in a vehicle crash. These stats are chilling.

The following suggestions can help you do your part to reduce the number of motorcycle accidents on Michigan roads this year.

STOP – The law says to come to a complete stop when entering a roadway from a parking lot, driveway, or other road. A stop sign does not have to be posted for the law to be in effect. Quite often, I encounter people who are shocked to learn that leaving their own driveway is included in this motor vehicle code. An extra five seconds to bring your vehicle to a complete stop can save a life. "Rolling through a stop sign" can, and most often will, get you ticketed if observed by a police officer.

BE PATIENT – It is more difficult to judge the speed and distance of a motorcycle than a truck or car. If you are unsure if you have time to pull onto a roadway, just wait. It is difficult for a motorcyclist to make quick maneuvers so if you pull out in front of them, you are most likely going to cause an accident.

DOUBLE CHECK – Motorcycles can easily be lost in the blind spots of your vehicle. Taking extra time to check twice can save a life. Many of the crashes that occur between a motorcycle and a vehicle happen when the vehicle is making a left turn. Always double check to your left side when pulling out into traffic. In addition, make sure before you change lanes that you have clear visibility behind you and that you are not missing a motorcycle in your back corner.

REMOVE GRASS CLIPPINGS – One less talked about, but important issue for motorcyclists is when people blow grass or leaves into the roadway when mowing. Leaving yard waste on the roads can make it difficult for a motorcycle to stop and turn as needed. Be a caring citizen and keep your grass and leaves out of the roadway.

Summer is a great time to hit the road and venture to your favorite Michigan destination. Vehicles and motorcycles should be able to share the road without the fear of a devastating accident. Take heed of these suggestions and enjoy your Summer. There is nothing else like it!

Prepare for the Summer Tax Collection Season

Taxpayers have until September 16th to settle their summer tax bills without facing any penalties. For your convenience, we offer online payment options including credit/debit card and eChecks, with applicable fees. Additionally, you can set up a direct debit by requesting a form from the Treasurer's Office. If you haven't already received your tax bill, simply contact the Treasurer's Office to request a copy or inquire about the amount owed.

Understanding the Utility Billing Process

Managing utility bills is an essential aspect of responsible homeownership or tenancy. Water and sewer services come with a quarterly billing cycle, which can sometimes be confusing to navigate. Understanding the intricacies of the billing process can help residents stay on top of their payments and avoid any unnecessary complications.

Quarterly Billing Cycles

Residents who have a water and/or sewer service will find themselves on a quarterly billing cycle. Within this system, there are three distinct billing cycles in total. Each cycle corresponds to specific months throughout the year. This predetermined schedule helps residents anticipate and manage billing periods efficiently.

Cycle 1	Cycle 2	Cycle 3
August	March	January
November	June	April
February	September	July
May	December	October

Billing and Due Dates

Every month, a billing cycle is processed, aligning with the designated cycle assigned to each resident. Bills are typically mailed out by the 5th of the month corresponding to the billing cycle. However, if the 25th falls on a weekend or holiday, the due date is shifted to the next business day. This adjustment ensures that residents have adequate time to submit their payments without penalties or late fees.

Communication Channels

Maintaining open lines of communication between residents and the Utility Billing Department is vital for a smooth billing process. If residents fail to receive their bills by the 10th of the billing cycle month, they are encouraged to reach out to the department promptly. This proactive approach allows for the timely resolution of potential issues, such as lost or undelivered bills. Additionally, Thomas Township offers various alternatives for receiving and paying bills to accommodate different preferences and lifestyles:

Email Bills: Opting to receive bills via email provides residents with a convenient and eco-friendly alternative to traditional mail. (see enclosure)

Direct Debit (Auto Pay): Enrolling in automatic payments through direct debit ensures that bills are paid promptly each billing cycle, eliminating the risk of late payments. (see enclosure)

Online Payment: Our secure payment website lets residents conveniently pay their bills online using credit/debit cards or e-checks, with applicable fees. Please contact the Utility Billing Department if you have questions on how to pay your water/sewer bill online.

Conclusion

Navigating the utility bill process doesn't have to be daunting. Residents can streamline the process and ensure timely payments by understanding the billing cycles, due dates, and available payment options. Thomas Township has more than 240 businesses motivated by various business and community activities. The 100-member Thomas Township Business Association's purpose is to help the local businesses work together for a stronger community. It was incorporated in 1978, as the Shields Civic Association. The course was redesigned in the 90's by Michigan's premiere golf course architect Jerry Matthews. The course features large undulating greens with three sets of tees. The course features 5,985 yards of golf from the longest tees for a par of 70. High Grass and Noxious Weeds

In Thomas Township, it is the responsibility of the property owner to keep lawn to a height of no more than ten inches (10"). Exceeding this is a violation of the "Noxious Weeds and Uncontrolled Plant Growth Ordinance". If you receive a notification that you are in violation of the ordinance, please bring the property into compliance promptly. Working together will help to keep the appearance of the neighborhood and Township to a higher standard as well as deterring any vermin from finding a habitat to live. Contact the Code Enforcement Officer at (989) 781-0150 for any questions, concerns, or if you need extra time to get the issue corrected. Additional time may be provided as long as you are making progress to correct the violation. Let's do our best to enhance the quality of living in our Township.

Warmer weather is upon us and it is a great time to come for a visit to the Thomas Township Nature Center and Preserve! The Nature Center is open on Tuesdays from 3:00 pm - 7:00 pm, Wednesdays-Fridays noon-4:00 pm, and the first Saturday of the month from 10:00 am -2:00 pm. Feel free to stop in for a visit! The Nature Preserve is open daily from dawn to dusk.

We have programs that are free of charge! On Tuesdays from 5:00 pm - 7:00 pm, come for our F.U.N. (Families United in Nature) evening, where there are six or so science, nature, craft, or snack activities to participate in. Most visitors usually spend about an hour or so going through the activities, enjoying the preserve, and enjoying free play time in the children's interactive area. On Wednesdays, we welcome adults of all ages from noon - 2:00 pm to come visit, have a snack, and play any of the games we have here. On Thursdays, our Little Acorns preschool group meets from 1:00 pm - 2:00 pm to play, listen to a story, do activities or crafts, and go outside for a bit. We have displays! Our display area is getting an overhaul, but you will be able to check out the Native American, logging, Hidden Hollow, and Thomas Township historical displays, as well as our habitat area. Local artist Eric Schantz has used his talents to enhance the experience.

Thomas Township Parks and Recreation has a variety of parks for our residents to enjoy. From fishing ponds to ball diamonds, from miniature trains to concerts, from soccer fields to bike trails we have it all.

Roberts Park 455 South Miller Road

Four softball diamonds, playgrounds, walking trails, fishing pond, Farmers Market, soccer fields, sand volleyball, pavilions, and disc golf.

Roethke Park 400 Leddy Road

Swimming pool, sand volleyball courts, bandshell, fishing pond, three pavilions, two miniature trains, playground, hiking trails, and the home of Roethke Park Day Camp and the Haunted Train Ride.

Day Park 700 South River Road

Known for its sledding hill during winter, Day Park is a beautiful green space that offers plenty of room for kids to run around.

Community Park

Community Park had a major renovation this spring and will be open for use in July. The park added six brand new pickleball courts, new basketball court, and two new playscapes.

The Nature Center

Come visit our little part of "Up North" at the Nature Center 6660 Gratiot Road. New this year is a kayak launch and we will have some new trails being installed along with a fishing pier.

Farmer's Market

In 2022, with the help from Schomaker Farms, the Thomas Township Farmer's Market was established and found a home in Roberts Park under the former "Men's Club Pavilion" which was restored by the Parks and Recreation department in 2018 - 2019. This spring we added a fifty foot by 100 foot concrete slab to expand the market space and we have filled it with new vendors already!
