Trash Pickup the week of Trash & Treasures Yard Sales - June 13th

On **THURSDAY**, June 13th, please put your trash to the road **BEFORE** going to bed. Trash pick-up will run overnight into Friday morning.

Trash pick-up will run at a different time during the yard sales so that the drivers can easily pass down streets and pick up trash before the roads become congested with traffic. If the driver is unable to go down a road due to traffic congestion, the driver must turn around and your trash will not be picked up until the following week. Some of our roads are narrow or dead ends which would make it difficult if not impossible for the driver to safely navigate the truck.



Infrastructure Boom in Thomas Township Continues

On February 27th, 2024, the State of Michigan in coordination with the Michigan Economic Development Corporation and Saginaw Future announced funding to support infrastructure improvements in Thomas Township.

Corning Incorporated will construct a new manufacturing facility on the border of Richland and Thomas Township on North Orr Road. Investing up to \$900 million, the plant will target to create up to 1,100 new jobs. Thomas Township will be supplying the water and sewer services to the site, which will require some substantial infrastructure improvements. The identified water and sewer improvements are noted below:

- Gravity Sewer on North Orr Road from O'Hara heading south to Geddes Road.
- New Sewer Pumping Station at the southeast corner of Geddes and Orr Road.
- New Sewer Force Main heading east on Geddes Road terminating into the currently under-construction pump station at the northwest corner of Geddes and Gleaner Roads.
- Upgrades to the City of Saginaw's Gratiot Road Booster Station near the Tittabawassee River which delivers drinking water to all residents in Thomas Township.
- Water Pressure Boosting Station located at the Township's water tower site on Graham Road, south of Geddes Road.
- 5 Check Valve Structures around the Township to support the Water Pressure Booster Station.
- New 12" water main on North Orr Road between Frost and Dice Roads.
- Water main and valve repair at the intersection of Graham and Gratiot Roads.

All of these projects will be worked on simultaneously. Coordination with our residents on when these improvements will be completed is paramount to their success. We will do our best to notify you of any upcoming work that will specifically impact you. One of the easiest things you can do to ensure you receive the notices is to sign up for updates from Saginaw County Emergency Notification Services. I will be utilizing this service to get area-specific updates to residents by a text message or call to your phone. Please follow this link below to the website, or use your favorite internet search engine and type "SAGINAW COUNTY EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION REGISTRATION," and click the link from the County. Once you have signed up, please make sure you opt into the "Utility" notifications as well.

Outdoor Water Restrictions Start June 1st

Beginning June 1st the annual outdoor water restrictions will be taking effect. The outdoor water restriction will continue until August 31st, 2024. During the restrictions using outdoor water for washing the car, watering the garden or grass, and other summer activities will be limited according to your address.

Even number addresses may use outdoor water on even days and odd number addresses may use water on odd days. By putting these restrictions in place, we can control excessive demands for water, which helps keep our water rates lower. Thomas Township greatly appreciates your cooperation as we conserve our water resources.



Grass Mowing Requirements

Now that April is officially here, it's time to think about getting your lawn mower ready to cut for the summer. It is the responsibility of the property owner to keep lawns to a height of no more than ten inches (10") beginning May 1st. Exceeding this is a violation of the "Noxious Weed Ordinance". If you receive a notification that your property is in violation and do not bring the property into compliance, Thomas Township may enter the property and cut the weed/plant growth. Any expenses incurred to do so will be the responsibility of the property owner and they will be charged accordingly. Upkeep of the property helps to keep the appearance of the neighborhood and Township to a higher standard as well as deterring any vermin from finding a habitat to live. The Swan Valley School District entered into a partnership with the Thomas Township Police Department which provided the district with their first School Resource Officer, Rafe Maxwell. Officer Maxwell has been in this position since August of 2023. Officer Maxwell visits school buildings daily, forming relationships with students and staff, attends lunch hours, and monitors the parking lots. He genuinely enjoys interacting with students of all ages and is frequently seen out at elementary recess or shooting hoops in the gym with the kids.

This year he also partnered with Ms. Shelley Hanson (Swan Valley High School Principal) and the Community Education Department to develop a smoking/drug prevention and response

program. The class helps students who have been struggling with nicotine and/or other addictions that affect their learning. Brad Jeske, Health Resource Advocate, and Officer Maxwell partnered to teach the students about the negative effects of drugs and how damaging they are in all areas of life. They have held one class so far and have seen a positive response to it.

Officer Maxwell was also involved with The Amazing Race, a school fundraising event made possible by the dedication and heart of the school's guidance counselor, Christine Luplow. The students and staff raised over \$5,500 in charitable donations, and Officer Maxwell had the pleasure of delivering some of the gifts to families that benefited from the event.

Officer Maxwell is "rolling with the punches" as he puts it. Every week there is a new experience at school. Whether it is school-related, or law enforcement-related, he is constantly learning with every new endeavor. "If just my presence alone makes even one student feel safe at school, then the challenges and struggles of this new position are well worth it. Even before Columbine, we as a Country, have been looking for an answer to school violence and school safety. I truly believe SROs are the answer. I am proud to be the first Swan Valley School District School Resource Officer" says Officer Rafe Maxwell. "We very much appreciate Thomas Township's commitment to our district and the safety of our students, and it is our hope that this program will remain in place for the long term," stated Superintendent Mat McRae.

Student and faculty safety is the main goal of the SRO program. Also important is the student and police interaction. Officer Maxwell has proven to be a good fit for this program. The goal is for the relationship between students and the police to continue to grow. As Chief of the Thomas Township Police Department, I am thrilled that this has been a successful experience so far and I look forward to the continued partnership with the Swan Valley School District.

Dog Ownership Responsibility in Thomas Township

Almost fifty percent of U.S. households own at least one dog, or chances are if you do not own a dog, you most likely live next door to or near someone who does. Dogs are the most popular household pets, beating out the second place, cats, by approximately eighteen million. Below are four legal issues related to dog ownership that every dog owner should know.

The State of Michigan requires that every dog, older than four months, have a dog license. To get a license, your dog must be current on their rabies vaccination. The yearly licenses can be obtained locally at the Saginaw Animal Center, the Saginaw County Treasurer's office, your veterinarian's office, or at the Thomas Township office (December 1st through February 28th only). Dog licenses help reunite lost dogs with their owners, and the funds raised from the license fees go toward helping care for lost, abandoned, mistreated, or injured animals.

In addition to having your dog licensed, owners are expected to keep their dogs appropriately contained on their property. When on public property, leashes are a requirement. Many dog owners like to let their dogs run free, but this is a violation of the law which could result in a ticket. Or worse yet, you could be liable if your dog were to bite someone because you didn't adequately contain it.

On occasion, my officers get called to homes for barking dogs. There is some confusion, and sometimes disbelief from residents, related to the barking dog ordinance. Dog owners are expected to keep their dogs from "frequent or continued duration of sounds which create a noise disturbance across a residential real property boundary." It is not unreasonable to expect a dog to bark if they see a squirrel or another dog. What is not right is if a dog is left outside and unattended to bark nonstop with no one to interrupt this action. Dog owners who have doggy doors that allow the dogs to go outside should have a plan in place, such as a neighbor who can intervene if the dog becomes a disturbance. It is understandable that people work and need to let their dogs outside for breaks. Fortunately, there are services available that will provide dog walking or "let out" breaks to help assist people who can't get home during the day.

Lastly, while it is not a fun topic to discuss, there are laws regarding your dog's waste. Not all dogs are disciplined enough to take a walk without using it as an opportunity to relieve themselves. If you have a dog that likes to mark its territory while on a walk, try walking on a trail or a less residential area than the local neighborhood. If that is not an option, start your walk by going around your yard first, hopefully getting your dog to take care of its business before starting the walk. If you are walking on a sidewalk, have your dog walk between the sidewalk and the road as opposed to walking in the neighbor's yard. Also, if a dog tries to leave its scent on the neighbor's manicured landscaping, pull it away and opt for the dandelion or pinecone instead. It is not just an unsightly nuisance; it is full of harmful bacteria which can stay in the ground long after the poop itself is gone. It is not a fertilizer, as I know many dog owners like to claim. It is bad for the lawn and can be unsafe for humans as well as other pets. Dog waste can take weeks, months, or even up to a year to decompose. Be a responsible dog owner and pick up after your dog.

Dog ownership comes with many rewards but also big responsibilities. Following these simple guidelines will help you stay clear of law enforcement and allow you to enjoy your pet, hopefully for many years to come. A copy of the

Fire Station #1 - New Chapter



Fire Station #1

As you know, Fire Station #1 underwent a facelift for some much needed improvements. The improvements included a radio dispatch room, a command room, and a meeting room. The meeting room also serves as a polling location for three precincts and a training room for our firefighters.

The February election was held in the new room and the improved accommodations met the needs of a polling location. It was neat, streamlined, and easier to navigate where to go. The easier access with no stairs to tackle was a hit. Another huge advantage is its climate-controlled environment and a clearer separation between the fire response area and the voting area. In fact, on the day of the election, we responded to three high-priority calls that never impacted the election at all. That wasn't the case in the past.

We've already held a few training classes in this room and it has served our needs perfectly. It will be the location for hosting a continuing medical education class which is an annual requirement for our responders. This class will be attended by not only our responders but also our neighboring responders from the James, Richland, and Tittabawassee Fire Departments.

The new Radio Dispatch Room is twice the size, making it much easier for dispatch to function. It is the dispatch room that gets used on every call we respond to. This room becomes the epicenter when we are responding to high call volumes i.e. storm events.

Our previous Command Room was literally a large closet. With the improvement, four people can now work in this area more affectively. If they need to have a confidential conversation or debrief a call, this provides the space to do so.

We, as a Fire Department, are extremely pleased and thankful for the support we received in this venture. It is so nice to have adequate space to function in. We plan to hold an open house in the future where you can come in and see the improvements yourself. Below are some pictures of the new areas.

Texting - 911

You can now TEXT Saginaw County Central Dispatch (911). There may come a time when you witness something happening that you think may require emergency services, and a quick text to 911 can get emergency responders on the move. The situation may make you uneasy to physically call 911. This option would allow you to notify the police without bringing it to anyone's attention.

Recently, we had a nation-wide cell service outage. Text operates on a different band, so during a time of no cell service, most text messages can still go through. This is a huge benefit for those who need the help 911 provides. 911 can dispatch police, fire, and medical units to respond to your call for help.

A text to 911 still won't replace the advantages of actually speaking to a 911 operator, but if that is not possible the text option is available.

Storage Containers, Know the Law First!



A frequent question the Building Department is asked is about the use of portable storage containers. Thomas Township, like many other communities have an ordinance that allows for the use of these containers. In Thomas Township a storage container can be used for up to 30 days for all properties without an active permit. With an active building permit that time can be extended if your construction project is delayed, but only if approved by the Building Inspector and for only a limited time. Most people use a storage container to keep items such as household goods, personal

items, and construction materials dry and safe during construction, renovation, or after a disaster such as a fire or flood. This ordinance applies to both residential and agricultural zoning districts.

The Building Inspector is sometimes asked about using these containers for a shed or garage on a property. These containers cannot be used as a shed or a garage, they are only allowed for a limited time. When using a container, consider where you place the container on your property because it will damage lawns and will kill the grass underneath. Find a suitable location on your property to place the container that will meet all of the required setbacks. You are not allowed to create a safety hazard by placing the container in the front yard. Thomas Township Library offers many available services to the community. The library has been an integral part of the Township for many, many years with a continued focus on its mission. Established originally in 1989 the library has continually improved and added services. The Thomas Township Library, as an informational hub, dedicates itself to being an integral part of our community by providing residents of all ages equal access to diversified resources and services that support both life-long learning and the enrichment of the quality of life.

As a member of the White Pine Library Cooperative, Thomas Township residents who have a library card can access downloadable eBooks, digital audiobooks, and magazines through the Libby App. If you don't have a library card stop in with a picture ID showing your current address and we can get you one. Download the app on your device from our website, the Apple App Store, Google Play, or the Amazon App Store.

The library offers a collection of over 81,000 volumes including CDs, large print books, audiobooks, the Ancestry Library Edition database on in-house computers, and jigsaw puzzles. The library has computers for Internet access and word processing, wireless Internet if you want to use your device, a children's area, a young adult section, and a technology area. The library also offers book page, fax, photocopier, reserves, freedom machine, interlibrary loan, special needs, tax forms, and typewriters. Regular programs include an adult reading/discussion group and an adult coloring club. Youth programs offered are craft nights, preschool story time, summer reading, and a Tales for Two's program. In September we hold an annual book sale, (donations are accepted, please call ahead for details), a year-round used book cart for purchasing books, and blood drives.

Readers of all ages are welcome to join us this summer as Thomas Township Library presents, "Adventure Begins at Your Library". This year's theme will include so many activities related to great adventures within and outside the library, involving STEM, nature, and lots of hands-on fun! The 2024 Summer Reading Program is open to preschool through teens/young adults and adults. Building Our Community: Community Park Improvements

Thomas Township Parks continue to grow and improve, providing many quality recreational activities and opportunities. The Parks and Recreation department has developed a truly unique program philosophy where we maintain the highest standards of coaching and sportsmanship, while kids play in a distinctive, noncompetitive environment. We strive to provide the best programs and parks possible and are always looking at new and innovative ways to improve our recreation opportunities we are able to offer. As part of that growth and improvement, Community Park located at the Thomas Township Municipal Campus (corner of North Miller & Shields Drive) was in need of some major upgrades. It has also been part of the Township's long-term Recreation Plan to recreate the Community Park into a multi-faceted modern park to serve our neighborhoods on the north side of Gratiot Road.





With the new municipal office building being built, the Township agreed that this was the perfect opportunity to finally accomplish this goal. The condition of the courts were in need of major repairs having been built in the early 1960's and

converted multiple times from their original purpose as tennis courts. After considering the costs and advantages/disadvantages of several possible locations, the Board decided that locating the new building between the

Library and Fire Station would be the most cost-effective location, and it would keep all of the Township services in a centralized area on the Campus. Besides, it then made it possible to rebuild a NEW and BETTER Community Park as planned for the last twenty years.



The park will be located on the grass area that has served as the occasional ice rinks just south of the new municipal building between Culvers and Shields Drive. The New Community Park will feature a brand new stand-alone basketball court along with six state-of-the-art pickleball courts separated with a walking path and benches leading to the parking lot behind Culvers. Once completed, the courts will have a very strong resemblance to the Garber Courts built in the city recently. Along with the courts, there will be two new play areas dedicated to two different age groups. One section will be created for kids ages 2 - 5 and the other section will be focused upon kids ages 5 - 12. Along with the play structures there will be swing sets, rope climbers, spring riders, and hop rocks for kids to enjoy.

Like the name Community Park implies, the new modern playground is a community-project. Donations from the Thomas Township Downtown Development Authority (DDA) of \$100,000, the Thomas Township Business Association of \$25,000, and the Thomas Township Kiwanis Club of \$25,000 are providing the funding for the equipment. However, we want you and other members of our community to help with the actual construction. As part of the Building Our Community, Community Park improvements, we are looking for volunteers to help put together the new playgrounds. The build will happen sometime in late July. 
