Upcoming Election in Thomas Township

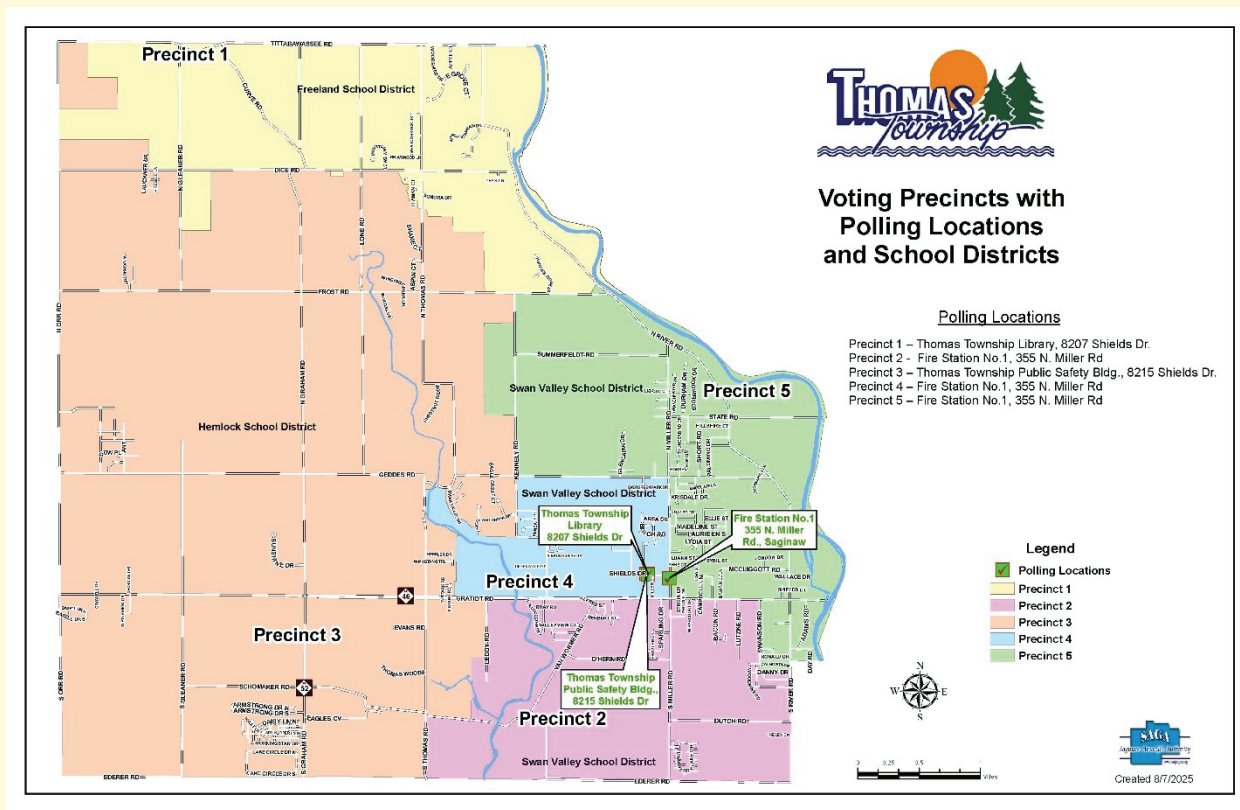


The State Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, August 4, 2026. This will be the first election in Thomas Township since the precinct changes were completed last year. New voter cards were sent at that time informing all Township electors of any change in their precinct location and/or precinct number.

To ensure you are voting at the correct location, below is a list of current precinct numbers and their locations. I have also listed the precinct number and location from the past.

Please note that Thomas Township has sent out a number of letters informing our Electors who were previously on a Permanent Absentee Voter Application list that we will no longer send these applications out. There is now a Permanent Ballot list. You will automatically receive a ballot for any Thomas Township election you are eligible to vote in. Most of those who previously received an Absentee Ballot application have made the transition and signed up for the Permanent Ballot list. For those who have not, you may still receive an Absentee Ballot, but you must request one by completing an online AV application or stopping in at the Clerk’s office to request one at 249 N. Miller Road.

2026 Summer Tax Bills

The 2026 Summer Tax Collection Season begins July 1, 2026. Summer taxes are due September 14, 2026, without penalty. If you do not receive your tax bill by mid-July, please contact the Treasurer's Office to request a copy. Property owners are responsible for payment even if a bill is not received. If you have recently changed your mailing address, please notify the Thomas Township Treasurer's Office so we can update our records and ensure future tax bills are delivered correctly.

When residents receive their summer tax bill, they may wonder what the charges represent. The summer tax bill comprises two millages: the State Education Tax (SET) and the Saginaw County Operating Millage. Although the Township collects these taxes, the revenue is remitted to the State of Michigan and Saginaw County.

State Education Tax (SET)

The State Education Tax is a statewide levy of 6 mills that helps fund public education throughout Michigan.

Saginaw County Operating Millage

The County Operating Millage helps fund county services.

Payment Options

Online: Pay securely by credit card, debit card, or e-check through the Thomas Township website at www.thomastwp.org. Under *Quick Links*, select *Pay Utilities/Taxes*, then *Pay a Bill*, choose *Tax*, and search by name, address, or parcel number.

In Person: Visit the Treasurer's Window at the Municipal Office Building. We accept cash or checks made payable to the Thomas Township Treasurer.

Drive-Through Drop Box: A secure drop box is located on the north side of the Thomas Township Municipal Building for added convenience. Please include your tax bill or parcel number to ensure your payment is properly applied.

By Mail: Payments may be mailed to the Thomas Township Municipal Office Building located at 249 N Miller Road, Saginaw, MI 48609. Please allow adequate time for delivery to ensure timely payment. The Township is not responsible for delays in the mail or payments not received. Post marks are not accepted.

Direct Debit: Avoid late payments and the hassle of writing checks by enrolling in our Direct Debit program. Property tax payments can be automatically withdrawn from your checking or savings account on the due date. **To participate in the current tax cycle, new direct debit enrollment forms must be submitted before September 14, 2026.** Contact the Thomas Township Treasurer's Office for enrollment information or visit our website to obtain a form.

Lithium Battery Safety: Simple Steps to Protect Your Home and Family

Battery-powered equipment is increasingly common. As usage grows, we in the fire department are more aware of potential hazards for you and for responders.

Lithium-ion batteries power everyday devices such as smartphones, laptops, power tools, e-bikes, and scooters. While generally safe, damaged or improperly charged batteries can be a serious fire risk.

As more residents use rechargeable devices, it is important to understand how to safely charge, store, and dispose of lithium batteries.

Lithium Battery Safety Tips

Charge Safely

- Always use the charger designed for your device or one approved by the manufacturer.
- Avoid charging devices on beds, couches, or other soft surfaces where heat can build up.
- Place charging devices on a hard, nonflammable surface.
- Do not leave batteries charging unattended overnight whenever possible.

Unplug chargers when batteries are fully charged.

Watch for Warning Signs

Stop using a battery or device immediately if you notice:

- Swelling or bulging
- Excessive heat
- Unusual odors
- Smoke
- Leaking fluids

Strange noises such as popping or hissing.

Move the device away from combustible materials if it can be done safely and contact the manufacturer for guidance.

Store Batteries Properly

- Keep batteries in a cool, dry location.
- Avoid exposure to extreme heat, direct sunlight, or freezing temperatures.
- Store spare batteries away from metal objects such as keys, coins, or tools that could cause a short circuit.

Do not stack damaged batteries with other household items.

Handle with Care

- Do not puncture, crush, modify, or attempt to repair lithium batteries.
- Protect batteries from impact and physical damage.

Replace batteries that show signs of wear or damage.

Lithium Battery Safety: Simple Steps (Cont.)

E-Bikes and E-Scooters

E-bikes and e-scooters contain larger lithium-ion batteries that require extra attention.

- Purchase devices and replacement batteries from reputable manufacturers.
- Follow all charging instructions provided by the manufacturer.
- Never use damaged or incompatible batteries.
- Charge e-bikes and scooters away from exits, stairways, and escape routes.
- Do not store large batteries in areas where a fire could block evacuation.

Storing these in an outbuilding (shed or similar type structure) is safer than storing in your garage or house.

Proper Disposal Matters

Lithium batteries should never be thrown in household trash or recycling bins. Damaged batteries can ignite when crushed or exposed to heat during waste collection and processing.

Instead:

- Take batteries to an approved battery recycling or hazardous waste collection site.
- Tape battery terminals before transport if recommended by the recycling facility.

Follow local disposal guidelines for rechargeable batteries and electronic devices.

If a Battery Fire Occurs

Lithium battery fires can spread quickly and produce toxic smoke.

- Evacuate the area immediately.
- Call 911 from a safe location.
- Close doors behind you if possible to help contain the fire.
- Do not attempt to extinguish a large battery fire yourself.

A few simple precautions can greatly reduce the risk of battery-related fires. By properly charging, storing, and disposing of lithium batteries, Thomas Township residents can help keep their homes, families, and neighborhoods safe.

Information from the Department of Public Works

Consumer Confidence Report

In accordance with the Safe Drinking Water Act, Thomas Township is required to provide all users of the water system with a Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) each year before July 1. This report outlines the quality of the drinking water delivered to your home or business.

Annual Water and Sewer System Maintenance

Beginning in late April, DPW staff began annual maintenance activities on both the Township's water and sanitary sewer systems.

Water System Maintenance

Preventive maintenance will be performed on all fire hydrants throughout the Township. This work includes flushing water mains and testing the operation of individual hydrants. Hydrant flushing helps remove trapped air, stagnant water, and mineral buildup from the water distribution system while ensuring hydrants function properly during emergencies.

These maintenance activities help ensure the highest possible water quality and system reliability for our residents and businesses.

In addition, staff will be lubricating, painting, and color-coding hydrants while ensuring they remain visible and accessible. In certain areas, water pressure and flow testing will also be conducted during hydrant flushing operations.

This work will be completed in phases through October.

If you have a fire hydrant located on or adjacent to your property, please ensure that all plants, shrubs, and other landscaping are maintained at least six (6) feet from the centerline of the hydrant. This clearance is necessary so emergency responders can quickly locate, access, and operate the hydrant when needed.

Thank you for your cooperation.

Sanitary Sewer Maintenance

Sanitary sewer maintenance has begun and is continuing throughout the summer. DPW crews and contractors will be cleaning major portions of the sewer collection system using high-pressure water jetting equipment.

This preventive maintenance removes grease, debris, and other accumulated materials that can restrict sewer flow and contribute to backups. The work is expected to be completed by October 1.

Sidewalk Maintenance

The Department of Public Works also performs limited maintenance on publicly owned sidewalks throughout the Township. Staff routinely inspect sidewalks and remove trip hazards through a process known as scarification.

Sidewalks found to be in severe disrepair may be referred to the Township's Code Enforcement Department for further review and potential replacement.

Summer 2026 DPW Construction Projects

New Water Main on Shields Drive

A new 8-inch water main will be installed to replace the existing 4-inch water main. This improvement will increase available fire flows and improve overall system reliability in the area.

New Water Main at Roethke Park

A new 8-inch water main will be installed within Roethke Park, allowing for the installation of a new fire hydrant between the pool building and the depot. This project will also support potential future development within the park.

Gravity Sewer Lining on North Miller Road

DPW will be rehabilitating approximately one mile of 24-inch gravity sewer along North Miller Road, beginning near the Thomas Farms subdivision and extending southward.

Sewer Pump Station No. 1 Upgrades

Pump Station No. 1, located at the corner of Stroebel Road and South River Road, conveys all wastewater generated within Thomas Township to the Saginaw Charter Township Wastewater Treatment Plant on West Michigan Avenue.

This year, the Township will be replacing pumps, controls, and associated electrical equipment at the facility to improve reliability and operational efficiency.

A Reminder about Trash & Recycling Storage

To help keep Thomas Township clean and attractive, residents are reminded that solid waste, recyclables, and yard waste may not be placed at the curb more than 24 hours before their scheduled collection. When not awaiting collection, trash cans, recycling bins, garbage bags, and yard waste must be stored indoors or completely screened from view from the road and neighboring properties. Township-issued wheeled trash carts may be stored outdoors in a side yard or backyard but may not be stored in the front yard. Thank you for helping maintain the appearance and quality of our community.

Understanding the Firework Law in Michigan



Fireworks are a popular part of many Michigan celebrations, especially around Independence Day, Memorial Day, Labor Day, and New Year’s Eve. However, the use, sale, and discharge of fireworks are governed by state law and in some cases, local ordinances. Understanding these rules can help residents celebrate safely while avoiding fines and legal issues.

When Fireworks May Be Used

Michigan law protects the use of consumer fireworks during specific holiday periods. In communities that have adopted ordinances regulating fireworks, residents may legally discharge consumer fireworks after 11:00 a.m. on the following dates:

- December 31 until 1:00 a.m. on January 1.
- The Saturday and Sunday immediately preceding Memorial Day, until 11:45 p.m.
- June 29 through July 4, until 11:45 p.m.
- July 5, if it falls on a Friday or Saturday, until 11:45 p.m.

The Saturday and Sunday immediately preceding Labor Day, until 11:45 p.m.

Thomas Township regulates fireworks at other times of the year, but we do not prohibit their use during these protected holiday periods. All other days, fall under the noise ordinance and are not allowed between 10 p.m. - 7 a.m.

Where Fireworks May Be Used

Michigan law places important restrictions on where fireworks can be discharged. Individuals may not ignite or use consumer fireworks on:

- Public property
- School property
- Church property

Another person’s private property without express permission.

Violations may result in civil fines and other penalties.

Age Restrictions and Sales Regulations

Retail sales of consumer fireworks are regulated by the state. Businesses must obtain annual certification to sell consumer fireworks in Michigan. The law also prohibits the sale of consumer fireworks to minors, with significant penalties for violations. Retailers who repeatedly violate the law may face fines and suspension of their certification.

Safety Considerations

Michigan officials strongly encourage residents to use fireworks responsibly. Safety recommendations include:

- Following manufacturer instructions.
- Keeping a bucket of water or hose nearby.
- Lighting one firework at a time.
- Never attempting to relight malfunctioning fireworks.
- Keeping children and pets at a safe distance.

Avoiding the use of fireworks while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

Please be safe when handling fireworks as injuries are reported every year. If there are any questions, please contact the Thomas Township Police Department at (989) 781-1300.

Yard Lawn Maintenance



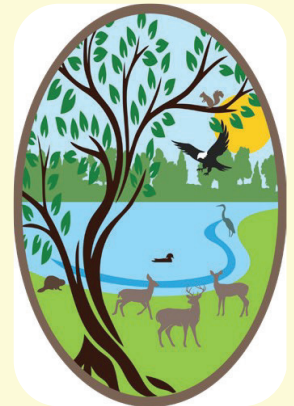

Community Park 249 North Miller Road

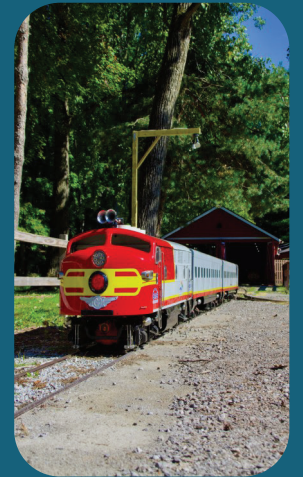
The park has six pickleball courts, a basketball court, and two playscapes.

ONLINE REGISTRATION is available for Parks and Recreation Programming. You can access the online registration at thomastwp.org. Registration is a two step process. Once you hit **REGISTER NOW**, you will register, agree to the terms and hit **SEND**. You will then be redirected to the payment option on the next screen. From there you should receive a confirmation email of payment. If you do not receive a confirmation, then your payment was not processed and the registration will not be completed.

Brush Drop Off

Cameras are installed to monitor use.

Brush may be taken by the homeowner to the Township brush drop off site located at the northwest corner of N. Gleaner & Frost Road. No stumps, leaves, grass, or commercial brush of any kind will be accepted. The site will be open the entire weekend, Saturday and Sunday, and closed back up first thing Monday morning.
